Eva Schmid - piano

Eva studied piano, voice, organ and harpsichord in Switzerland, graduating from the Bern conservatory. She has performed as soloist with the Deep River Symphony and the Valley Festival. She teaches piano, voice and music and movement in Deep River, Pembroke and Ottawa

Valerie Selander Voisey - violin

Originally from Deep River, Valerie Selander Voisey graduated with a Bachelor of Music in Performance from the University of Toronto in 1988. She played with the Thunder Bay Symphony Orchestra as Principal Second Violin for four seasons. She has performed with the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony Orchestra, The New Hamilton Orchestra, the Canadian Opera Company Orchestra and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra.

Karen Graves - violin

Karen Graves, a native of Nova Scotia, began playing the violin at the age of eight. She graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Performance from the University of Toronto, and has a post-graduate Diploma in Performance from the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama. She freelances in Toronto, playing in various orchestras and ensembles, and performs improvisations on the electric violin.

Sheila Smyth - viola

Sheila Smyth lives in Toronto and freelances with various orchestras and ensembles in Southern Ontario. She has recently performed on the CBC and CFMX with the Emperor String Quartet.

Mary Stein - violoncello

Mary Stein graduated from the Université de Montréal with a Master's degree in Violoncello. Reuven Rothman - bass

Max Christie - clarinet

Max Christie is principal clarinet of the National Ballet and the Esprit Orchestra. He has been heard frequently on the CBC's "Two New Hours" and "On Stage" programs. He has a Bachelor of Music (Performance) from the University of Western Ontario and a Master's degree from Yale University. He has appeared as soloist with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra and the Philharmonia Orchestra of Yale.

Christian Sharpe - bassoon

Christian Sharpe hails from Sudbury, where he was known as the "Saxophone Colossus of the North". Christian now plays bassoon and contrabassoon with the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony Orchestra. He has appeared with the Hamilton Philharmonic and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and freelances in Toronto, playing in musicals and chamber music recitals and on commercial recordings.

Neil Spaulding - french horn

A freelance horn player living in Toronto, Neil has performed with the Moscow Virtuosi, the Canadian Opera Company, the National Ballet, the Hamilton Philharmonic, the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony and the Esprit Orchestra, and with Ray Charles and the Boss Brass. At 19, he gave up teaching music and began a life of poverty, devoted to musical composition. His friends supported him as best they could. Where the land still lies out yonder.


